ANNUAL HEALTH DISPARITIES CONFERENCE AT TEACHERS COLLEGE, COLUMBIA UNIVERSITY. 3/06 to 3/09; revived 2013-2015. Founded and Directed from 2006-2009, and again from 2013-2015, a national two-day conference. The highly successful series of 7 annual conferences resulted in a record of publications, PowerPoints, and YouTube video presentations that stand as a testament to the magnitude of the contribution made to the fields of health, health disparities, and equity in health. The 1st 2006 conference declared (theme) a Decade of Health Disparity Reduction: Toward Evidence-Based Models, as the conference theme. The 2nd 2007 conference theme was: Physical, Emotional, Mental, and Spiritual Health: Toward Integrated Evidence-Based Approaches to Health Disparity Reduction. The 3rd 2008 conference theme was: Toward Global Health Transformation: Research, Demonstration Projects, and Model Interventions to Reduce Disparities in Health. The 4th 2009 conference theme was: Achieving Cultural Competence: Acquiring Requisite Knowledge, Attitudes and Skills for an Evidence-Based Revolution Bringing Equity in Health to All. The conference era ended along with that of the main sponsor, the Teachers College Center for Educational Outreach and Innovation (CEO&I), in the spring of 2009; CEO&I was terminated by the college in May 2009, hence I made the decision to end the conference. However, upon request of the college's Provost, the conference was revived in 2013 (with CHEUSE Co-Director Christopher Emdin—while also highlighting "Health + Hip Hop"—and being a live webinar) as the 5th Annual Health Disparities Conference with the theme: Culturally Appropriate Research, Practice and Policy Approaches to Health Disparities within a Stress and Coping Bio-Psycho-Social-Environmental-Cultural Framework. The 6th 2014 theme was: Urban to Global Health: Culturally Appropriate Research, Practice and Policy (Special Focus on Lessons Learned from an Analysis of 30 Years Since the Dawning of the Crack Epidemic in 1984). The 2015 7th conference was additionally named the Health Equity and Social Justice Conference, and the theme was: Research, Practice and Policy For Bending the Arc of the Moral Universe Towards Justice in the Era of Health Disparities, the School to Prison Pipeline, Mass incarceration, and the New Jim Crow. The Provost requested that I discontinue the conference series in September 2015; it had become the college's "largest conference." The Provost envisioned more smaller conferences with greater graduate student leadership opportunities.

BRIEF BIO:

Dr. Barbara Wallace is a Psychologist, tenured Professor of Health Education, and Director of the Programs in Health Education and Community Health Education within the Department of Health and Behavior Studies, Teachers College, Columbia University. In addition, Dr. Wallace is Director of Health Equity for the Center for Health Equity and Urban Science Education (CHEUSE), and Director of the Research Group on Equity in Health (aka Research Group on Disparities in Health [RGDH]). For her outstanding and unusual contributions to the field of psychology, Dr. Wallace has been honored with the status of Fellow within both Division 50 (Society of Addiction Psychology) and Division 45 (Society for the Psychological Study of Culture, Ethnicity and Race) of the American Psychological Association. Dr. Wallace is author of *Making Mandated Addiction Treatment Work* (Rowman and Littlefield) and editor of *Toward Equity in Health: A New Global Approach to Health Disparities* (Springer Publications)—as just two of her acclaimed publications. She is also the Abradehemaa of Larteh-Kubease, Ghana (a.k.a. the Queen Mother, Nana Ohemmaa Oparebea Agyiriwa, II).

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH:

EDUCATION/TRAINING

Dr. Wallace is a New York state licensed Psychologist, tenured Professor of Health Education, and Coordinator of the Programs in Health Education and Community Health Education. She is Co-Director of the Center for Health Equity and Urban Science Education (CHEUSE), and Director of Health Equity, CHEUSE. Further, she is Director of the Research Group on Equity in Health, as well as Director of Global HELP – Health Education Leadership Program. All of this leadership occurs within the Department of Health and Behavior Studies at Teachers College, Columbia University. She graduated from Princeton University (AB, 1980; Major: Psychology, Certificate in Afro-American Studies), the City University of New York (Ph.D., 1985; Clinical Psychology), and completed post-doctoral training with NDRI (Narcotic and Drug Research, Inc., now National Development Research Institutes).

THE HONOR OF FELLOW

For her outstanding and unusual contributions to the field of psychology, Dr. Wallace has been honored with the status of Fellow within both Division 50 (Society of Addiction Psychology) and Division 45 (Society for the Psychological Study of Culture, Ethnicity and Race) of the American Psychological Association.

PUBLICATIONS

Dr. Wallace's 11 books include the following: *Crack Cocaine: A Practical Treatment Approach for the Chemically Dependent* (1991); *The Chemically Dependent: Phases of Treatment and Recovery* (Editor, 1992); *Adult Children of Dysfunctional Families: Prevention, Intervention and Treatment for Community Mental Health Promotion* (1996); *Understanding and Dealing with Violence: A Multicultural Approach* (with coeditor Robert T. Carter, PhD, 2003); *HIV/AIDS Peer Education Training Manual: Combining African Healing Wisdom and Evidence-Based Behavior Change Strategies* (2005); the first edition of *Making Mandated Addiction Treatment Work* (2005); *Toward Equity in Health: A New Global Approach to Health Disparities* (2008); *African Shamans and Ancient Shrines* (2008); *Asona Aberade Shrine* (with coauthor Nana Korantemaa Ayebofo, 2017); *Awakening Beyond Physicality* (with coauthor Nana Korantemaa Ayebofo, 2017); and the second edition of *Making Mandated Addiction Treatment Work* (March 5, 2019 release). In addition, she has edited/authored five other books within pro bono work for an international non-governmental organization. Dr. Wallace has also published numerous academic journal articles and chapters in edited books. Among her social justice-oriented endeavors, she has authored five independent reports, while several of them (i.e. 1999, 2007, 2010) have been archived as historical documents within Teachers College, Columbia University that trace efforts to foster diversity, inclusion, and affirmative action within the university.

KEYNOTES/WORKSHOPS/PRESENTATIONS

Dr. Wallace is engaged in regional, national, and international work as a consulting psychologist and expert witness. She also travels widely as keynote speaker, conference presenter, and workshop leader, covering a range of topics, as follows: global health and achieving equity in health for all; health disparities; multiculturalism, cultural competence, and diversity training; adaptive versus maladaptive coping to the stress of racism/oppression/diversity, including research conducted using her original package of measures; training trainers of HIV/AIDS peer educators and HIV/AIDS prevention; the community forum model as an intervention for communities in crisis and for community empowerment; repealing harsh laws/legislation contributing to the massive incarceration of drug offenders; making mandated addiction treatment work as an alternative to incarceration; chemical dependence treatment, in general; relapse prevention for a range of addictive/problem behaviors; harm reduction and abstinence approaches; treating the dually diagnosed; LGBT health issues; bullying and violence prevention; trauma resolution for sexual and physical abuse and domestic violence; and, spirituality, as a co-presenter with the Shaman, Nana Korantemaa Aybofo.

CO-DIRECTOR OF THE CENTER FOR HEALTH EQUITY AND URBAN SCIENCE EDUCATION (CHEUSE) – and, DIRECTOR HEALTH EQUITY, CHEUSE

As the Founder of the concept of the Center for Health Equity and Urban Science Education (CHEUSE), Dr. Wallace was delighted to be joined by Co-Director Christopher Emdin in launching in March 2013 the new CHEUSE. They share a vision of using multimedia technology to promote health and are pioneering “Health + Hip Hop” to involve youth in creating new 21st century school and community health education, as well as urban science education (see www.cheuse.org). Dr. Wallace is the Director of Health Equity within CHEUSE. CHEUSE sponsors conferences, seminars, and varied events, and, most importantly, includes the Research Group on Disparities in Health (RGDH).

FOUNDER/DIRECTOR OF THE RESEARCH GROUP ON EQUITY IN HEALTH

As the Founding Director of the Research Group on Disparities in Health (RGDH)—renamed (still aka) the Research Group on Equity in Health in October 2015—within the Department of Health and Behavior Studies at Teachers College, Columbia University, she supports the work of graduate students, post-doctoral fellows, and colleagues. This includes conducting a Research Seminar that brings together fellows and colleagues. The RGDH is now formally housed within the Center for Health Equity and Urban Science Education (CHEUSE). There have been 118 doctoral graduate fellows for the period from 2003 (founding of the RGDH) to May 2019—suggesting the success of the RGDH as an effective pipeline for addressing the national shortage of diverse doctorates, as the majority were racial/ethnic minorities, immigrants, or international students from around the globe, as well as members of the LGBT group of students.

A SPECIAL HONOR: ENSTOOLMENT AS AN AFRICAN TRADITIONAL RULER/QUEEN MOTHER

Within African Akan culture, enstoolment (being placed in a position as an African Traditional Royal) is one of the highest honors one can receive. Dr. Wallace was enstooled as a Queen Mother (African Traditional Royal) in 2000 at Larteh-Kubease, Ghana. Dr. Wallace is the Abradehema of Larteh-Kubease, Ghana (a.k.a. the Queen Mother, Nana Ohemaa Oparebea Agyiriwa, II). As such, she is actively involved in philanthropic activities to support health, education, and economic development in Africa; this work includes building an HIV/AIDS Peer Education Training Center, raising funds to build/renovate schools and for student scholarships, as well as editing/writing books pro bono that are used for fundraising for projects in Africa; for example, there has also been an African Water Project. She has also represented Ghana within the Global Indigenous Initiative sponsored by the United Religions Initiative.

HISTORICAL FACTS AT TEACHERS COLLEGE

Dr. Wallace was the first African American woman to *move through the ranks and gain tenure* in the 100-year history of Teachers College, Columbia University in Morningside Heights, doing so in 1994. Further, she has made history in graduating large cohorts of diverse doctoral students from around the globe, being especially dedicated to this as part of her mission at this university.
