ABOUT THE LCI CURRICULUM RESOURCE GUIDES



The Latinidad Curriculum Initiative (LCI) for New York City Public Schools aims to enhance the quality of education by providing a dynamic, interdisciplinary curricular framework and lesson plans that celebrate Latinidad and its connection to the histories, accomplishments, and cultures of our City and nation. The resources provided through this initiative seek to help teachers recognize who their students are and to enable the study, active reflection upon, and celebration of the histories, cultures, and intellectual contributions of Latinas and Latinos, thus providing a more comprehensive understanding of the dynamics of the city we live in and the places we call home. A curriculum that enables the study of Latinidades and their multiple and ever-evolving forms is meant to enhance school experiences by providing children and youth of all backgrounds opportunities to celebrate where we come from, what we have achieved, and what we desire for our families, communities, city, country, and world in the future.

As part of our curriculum development, in the second year of our initiative we hosted a series of Knowledge Building and Curriculum Writing Workshops during the 2025-2026 school year. The knowledge building workshops invited scholars and topical experts to engage with New York City Public Schools educators and administrators around the concept of Latinidad. We held four of these workshops at Teachers College, Columbia University:

- ***Centering Afro-Latinidad in New York City***, on October 9, 2025
- ***Narratives of Latinidad in New York City***, on November 4, 2025
- ***Sounds of Latinidad: Integrating Music and Arts Education into the K-12 Curriculum***, on January 13, 2026
- ***Lessons for the Study and Celebration of Latinidad***, on March 12, 2026

During knowledge building sessions, educators discussed the dynamic and multidimensional aspects of Latinidad; reflected personally and professionally on their connection(s) to this concept; and brainstormed in conversation with workshop facilitators and each other around how to incorporate lessons and resources about Latinidad into their teaching practice. As an outcome of these workshops, the LCI has created an ongoing series of **Curriculum Resource Guides**, published on our website (<https://www.tc.columbia.edu/latinidadnycschools/>) and designed for New York City educators, that is meant to complement the lesson plans we are developing for New York City Public Schools. The first five guides, described below, highlight content from our knowledge building workshops. These Curriculum Resource Guides thus represent a collaborative effort and body of knowledge and, while not exhaustive, include valuable and reliable resources—including scholarly and fictional texts; primary source documents; music, film, and audiovisual content; and historical and conceptual contexts—that teachers aiming to address the overlooked histories, knowledges, and contributions of the various communities that make up Latinidad in K-12 classrooms will benefit from using. They address just a few of the many important topics, regions, and heritage and national identities of Latinidad in New York City; our aim is to publish more as our curriculum develops. Our first five guides cover the following topics:

- ***Centering Afro-Latinidad in New York City***: This guide, authored by Yosef Medina and utilizing work done by the Afro-Latin@ Forum, offers a brief historical and conceptual background for understanding the importance of New York City as a main locus of Afro-Latinidad—including for intellectual, political, and artistic life and culture—in North America since colonial times. It also provides summaries of the interdisciplinary lesson plans within our larger curriculum prepared by Medina and his colleagues at the Afro-Latin@Forum that specifically address Afro-Latinidad, or the experience of descendance from both the African as well as Latin American and Caribbean diasporas.



- **Teaching Dominican Histories:** Authored by Alexa Rodríguez, this guide provides lists of materials organized by school level—children’s books, novels, scholarly books, academic articles, city excursions, music, videos, documentaries, and websites—that could be used in the classroom or at home to teach about the history and ongoing contributions of Dominicans in New York City.
- **Latinidad in Sounds:** Integrating Music and Arts Education into the K-12 Curriculum: Priscila Santana wrote this resource for those interested in using a music-centered lens and applying sound as a medium for mapping histories, forging connections, and (re)collecting memories to enrich students’ engagement with the diverse cultural ecosystems of New York City. It includes specific recommendations of genres, songs, and artists to explore.
- **Narratives of Latinidad in New York City:** Eddie Rivero, a scholar of bilingual education, curated this guide which consists of a reading list, organized by grade level, of texts that can inform culturally responsive teaching across K-12 settings.
- **Exploring Social, Political, and Cultural Experiences of Latinidad in New York City:** Carlos Decena, a scholar of gender and Latino studies, put together this guide to support teachers to explore complex topics in their classrooms, such as politics of labeling, political mobilizations and the rise of Latino Activism, politics of representation in the US media and arts, immigration, community formation, and transnationalism. It also includes curated lists of children’s books, novels, non-fiction books, scholarly articles, memoirs, poetry, films, documentaries, and audiovisual resources for different ages and grades.

We would like to thank the experts who facilitated these workshops and authored the Curriculum Resource Guides, the educators who participated in these workshops and made suggestions for resources, and the New York City Council for providing funding to make these possible.

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About the Author

Eddie Rivero, Ph.D., is a Visiting Assistant Professor at Teachers College, Columbia University, in the Bilingual/ Bicultural Education program. Dr. Rivero’s research is grounded in critical and sociocultural theories of learning and examines the tensions that emerge within sociotechnical systems, which can reproduce social inequities while also creating possibilities for youth and educators to envision and design more liberatory social futures. Following these lines of inquiry, Dr. Rivero’s work examines how teachers and out-of-school educators can leverage the affordances of everyday technologies to support the development of literacies that are consequential to students’ lives and the well-being of their communities. Drawing on participatory and social design-based experiments as methodologies, his work has shown how critical pedagogies can emerge when teachers learn from the ingenuity and relational agency that youth leverage to reimagine sociotechnical systems. Specifically, his publications have examined how educators can support youth to glitch and transform sociotechnical systems, reimagine virtual reality environments through transgressive play, and critique and redesign virtual ecologies in video games in ways that challenge hegemonic ideologies. Recent work has explored how educators can navigate tensions that emerge through the use of AI toward the development of culturally responsive pedagogies. Across these strands, Dr. Rivero’s scholarship illuminates how the social imagination and everyday media practices of youth, when supported through equity-centered pedagogies, can support forms of world-making rooted in justice, sustainability, and the thriving of non-dominant communities.

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NARRATIVES OF LATINIDAD IN NEW YORK CITY

Setting: The Bronx, NY and Puerto Rico

Author's Background: Nuyorican (born in the Bronx to Puerto Rican parents)

Description: A picture book memoir in which Sotomayor recounts how books shaped her childhood and sense of possibility. She describes reading as a source of connection across family in NY and Puerto Rico and as support through personal and family challenges.

 **I Love Saturdays y Domingos**

Grade Level: K-3

Setting: Centered on a child's home and her grandparents' homes

Author's Background: Cuban American

Description: A bilingual picture book in which a young girl spends Saturdays with her English-speaking grandmother and Sundays with her Spanish-speaking grandparents. The story highlights the bilingual everyday cultural practices that shape a child's identity across family contexts.



The Cot in the Living Room

Setting: Washington Heights, NY

Author's Background: Dominican American from NYC

Description: A young Dominican American girl envies the children who sleep on the living-room cot while their caregivers work night shifts. When she finally sleeps there herself, she recognizes the cot as a marker of others' hardship and learns empathy.



Caravan to the North: Misael's Long Walk

Grade Level: 4-6

Setting: El Salvador to Tijuana, along the route of a migrant caravan toward the US border

Author's Background: Nahua Pipil from El Salvador

Description: A verse novel narrated by Misael, a nine-year-old Salvadoran boy traveling with his family in a migrant caravan north. Through brief poems, he conveys the reasons for leaving and the mutual care that sustains people as they reach Tijuana and confront a closing border.

Author's Background: Born and raised in Miami, Florida

Description: This wordless graphic novel tells the story of Marisol, a young girl sent from Cuba to Brooklyn during the 1960s as part of Operation Peter Pan. The illustrations vividly depict her emotional journey adapting to a new culture and environment.

 *Ana María Reyes Does Not Live in a Castle*

Author's Background: Dominican American; born and raised in NYC

Description: Ana María navigates life in a cramped apartment with her Dominican family. She aspires to attend a prestigious private school and must excel in a citywide piano competition, all while dealing with family dynamics and a trip to the Dominican Republic.

Setting: NYC (2000-2001)

Author's Background: Puerto Rican American; based in NYC

Description: A graphic memoir capturing Alyssa's experiences as a middle schooler in NYC during 2001, including the events of 9/11, family dynamics, and personal growth.

 *Miss Quinces*

Grade Level: 5-8

Setting: NYC and Honduras

Author's Background: Colombian-Honduran American; born in NYC

Description: Sue, a comic-loving Latina from NYC, is forced to spend the summer in Honduras with her family, where she confronts cultural expectations and prepares for a quinceañera she does not want.



La Borinqueña (Graphic Novel)

Author: Edgardo Miranda-Rodriguez

Grade Level: 6-9

Setting: NYC and Puerto Rico

Author's Background: Puerto Rican American; based in NYC

Description: Marisol Rios De La Luz, a Columbia University student, gains superpowers connected to Puerto Rican heritage and becomes La Borinqueña, a symbol of Puerto Rican pride and activism.



Esperanza Rising

Grade Level: 6-7

Setting: Aguascalientes and California during the United States Great Depression

Author's Background: Mexican heritage; California

Description: After a family tragedy, Esperanza and her mother flee Mexico and rebuild their lives in California's farm labor camps during the Great Depression.



El Bronx Remembered: A Novella and Stories

Author: Nicholasa Mohr

Grade Level: 8-9

Setting: The South Bronx, NY

Author's Background: Puerto Rican descent; Nuyorican

Description: A novella plus short stories that portray everyday life in El Bronx through the perspectives of Puerto Rican children and families.

The Way It Was and Other Writings

Author: Jesús Colón

Grade Level: 9-12

Setting: NYC (primarily Brooklyn), early to mid-20th century

Author's Background: Afro-Puerto Rican writer and activist; born in Cayey, Puerto Rico; immigrated to NYC in 1917; known as the “Father of the Nuyorican movement”

Description: A collection of autobiographical essays reflecting on the experiences of Puerto Rican immigrants in NYC, highlighting themes of racial identity, labor struggles, and community resilience.



Body Bee Calling from the 21st Century

Author: Miguel Algarín

Grade Level: 11-12

Setting: Futuristic and urban landscapes, reflecting NYC and imagined 21st-century environments

Author's Background: Puerto Rican American; born in Santurce, Puerto Rico; co-founder of the Nuyorican Poets Café; professor at Rutgers University

Description: A collection of experimental poetry blending Afro-Caribbean rhythms, urban vernacular, and futuristic themes, exploring identity and transformation in a bionic 21st century.



When Love Was Reels: Poetry

Author: José B. González

Grade Level: 9-12

Setting: El Salvador and NYC

Author's Background: Born in San Salvador, El Salvador; immigrated to the US at age 8; professor of English at the US Coast Guard Academy

Description: A collection of narrative poems tracing a boy's journey from El Salvador to NYC, using iconic Latin American films and TV shows to explore identity, migration, and cultural memory.



A Matter of Pride and Other Stories

Author: Nicholasa Mohr

Grade Level: 9-12

Setting: NYC and the Caribbean

Author's Background: Puerto Rican American writer born in NYC's El Barrio (East Harlem); renowned for her works that depict the experiences of Puerto Rican women in urban settings

Description: A collection of seven short stories highlighting the lives of Puerto Rican women, exploring themes of identity, resilience, and cultural heritage.



Simpson Street and Other Plays

Author: Edward Gallardo

Grade Level: 11-12

Setting: NYC, primarily the Bronx

Author's Background: Puerto Rican American playwright whose works focus on the experiences of working-class Puerto Ricans in NYC

Description: A collection of three full-length plays, *Waltz on a Merry-Go-Round* (1975), *Simpson Street* (1979), and *Women Without Men* (1985) that explore the lives, struggles, and resilience of working-class Puerto Ricans in NYC.



Juliet Takes a Breath

Author: Gabby Rivera

Grade Level: 9-12

Setting: Bronx, NY and Portland, OR

Author's Background: Puerto Rican American; born in the Bronx

Description: A queer coming-of-age story about Juliet, a Puerto Rican teen, who explores her identity and feminism during an internship outside of NYC.



I'm a Wild Seed

Author: Sharon Lee De La Cruz

Grade Level: 9-12

Setting: NYC

Author's Background: Afro-Latinx, queer; born and raised in NYC

Description: A graphic memoir exploring queerness, race, and identity through autobiographical comics centered on the author's life in NYC.



Yaqui Delgado Wants to Kick Your Ass

Author: Meg Medina

Grade Level: 9-12

Setting: Queens, NY

Author's Background: Cuban American; based in Virginia

Description: Piddy Sanchez, a Latina teen in Queens, faces bullying and explores cultural identity and resilience in this powerful novel.



House on Mango Street

Author: Sandra Cisneros

Grade Level: 9-12

Setting: Chicago

Author's Background: Mexican American writer born in Chicago

Description: *The House on Mango Street* by Sandra Cisneros is a coming-of-age story told through short vignettes. It follows Esperanza, a Chicana girl in Chicago, as she navigates her identity, culture, and dreams of a better life. The book explores themes of gender, community, and the desire for independence.



American Street

Author: Ibi Zoboi

Grade Level: 9-12

Setting: Detroit

Author's Background: Haitian American

Description: The novel is about Fabiola, who was born in Detroit but raised in Haiti for most of her life. After migrating back to the US, her mother is detained by ICE, leaving Fabiola to live with her Americanized cousins on the west side of Detroit. Fabiola is confronted with an obstacle that compromises her freedom and challenges her to balance her faith and cultural clashes.



Love in English

Author: Maria E. Andreu

Grade Level: 9-12

Setting: New Jersey

Author's Background: Argentinian American

Description: Ana is a 16-year-old who recently migrated from Argentina to New Jersey to reunite with her father following a three-year separation. At first, she is reluctant to adjust to her new life, but soon finds new friends and even love interests in her English class. Ana explores her feelings through her poetry, where she begins her self-discovery journey.



Ysrael (from Drown)

Author: Junot Diaz

Grade Level: 9-12

Setting: The Dominican Republic

Author's Background: Dominican, Afro-Caribbean

Description: Told from the perspective of a Dominican boy, the story follows the narrator and his brother as they encounter a disfigured boy named Ysrael, weaving themes of cruelty, longing, and the formation of identity.



You Sound Like a White Girl: The Case for Rejecting Assimilation



Author: Julissa Arce

Grade Level: 7-12

Setting: US and Mexico

Author's Background: Mexican American, immigrated from Mexico at age 11

Description: A memoir against assimilation as a racialized demand for proximity to whiteness. Arce blends personal experience with historical narratives to show how assimilation pressures immigrant communities to suppress their language and cultural practices.



In the Country We Love: My Family Divided

Author(s): Diane Guerrero & Michelle Burford

Grade Level: 9-12

Setting: Boston and Colombia

Author's Background: Colombian American

Description: A memoir recounting how Guerrero's parents were deported when she was fourteen. The memoir draws on her personal narrative with reflection on US immigration enforcement.



Plantains and Our Becoming

Author: Melania Luisa Marte

Grade Level: 9-12

Setting: Movement across NYC, Texas, the Dominican Republic, and Haiti

Author's Background: Dominican American; NYC

Description: A poetry collection that examines the intertwined histories of the Dominican Republic and Haiti to center Black diasporic life. The collection draws on ancestral knowledge to challenge stereotypes and offer a joyful vision of Black identity and personhood.



Solito: A Memoir

Author: Javier Zamora

Grade Level: 9-12

Setting: El Salvador to the US via Guatemala and Mexico

Author's Background: Salvadoran American

Description: A memoir of a nine-year-old's unaccompanied migration to reunite with his parents. The story highlights the risks and the care that emerges through encounters with strangers on his journey north.



How the García Girls Lost Their Accents

Author: Julia Alvarez

Grade Level: 9-12

Author's Background: Dominican American

Description: Chronicles the García sisters' migration from the Dominican Republic to the US and their experiences straddling two cultures.



The Crazy Bunch

Author: Willie Perdomo

Grade Level: 9-12

Setting: East Harlem

Author's Background: Puerto Rican, Nuyorican

Description: Set over one transformative weekend in El Barrio (East Harlem), this verse novel follows a tight-knit group of Afro-Puerto Rican friends known as 'The Crazy Bunch.' As they navigate grief, street violence, love, and loyalty, the story offers a raw and poetic portrayal of urban youth culture, memory, and the resilience of community.



Clap When You Land

Author: Elizabeth Acevedo

Grade Level: 9-12

Setting: The Dominican Republic and NYC

Author's Background: Dominican American; NYC

Description: This is the story of two half-sisters, Camino and Yahaira Rios, who learn of each other after the sudden death of their father in a plane crash heading to the Dominican Republic. The half-sisters are vastly different in skin complexion and talent. Yahira a chess champion, and Camino, a swimmer and healer in the making. It is through their loss and uncovering of lies that the half-sisters build a bond.



Ander and Santi Were Here

Author: Jonny Garza Villa

Grade Level: 9-12

Setting: San Antonio, Texas

Author's Background: Mexican descent, born in Texas

Description: This story follows a nonbinary Mexican teen, Ander Martinez, living in San Antonio, Texas. They are taking a gap year to prepare for college and focus on their mural art. Ander's parents own a restaurant, and a recent new hire, Santi, has caught Ander's attention. In their growing romantic relationship, ICE agents come after Santi, who is undocumented.
