Antigone Alternative Response

The play, Antigone was written by Sophocles. It is about a girl who defies the king's law in order to obey god's law. She did what she thought was right even if there were consequences. Creon, the recent king of Thebes found out that she had broken his law. We find out the consequences of Creon's decision too. I think that other things could've been done in certain parts of the play to change the ending, so it wouldn't have been the tragedy it is.

In the play there are different turning points, the first was when Creon made his law.

Instead of thinking that a traitor deserves punishment he could've thought about his people's reaction and how others might've reacted, so this law would've never come into play. You can see his intentions and how it connects to the law he just made in his speech to the people of Thebes. "While I am king, the patriot will always be honored above the traitor and he who is loyal to the state shall have my praise in life as well as death." Page 115. Which is the reason he made the law, he valued loyalty to state but he never thought of loyalty to individuals, or family. "That man who places the good of a friend above the good of the state is beneath contempt." Page 116. If he had thought about such a thing he could've considered how Antigone acted to the law and reflected on whether his law was good or not. You also realize his stubbornness and paranoia when the messenger comes with the message of Polyneikes's burial, "I am aware that there are those here in Thebes

that have always opposed me... Refusing to submit to *me*, their *king*!.. bribing my sentries to bury that body!.. " Page 177. It shows you why things are the way they are and how he feels. That's an affect of being so blinded by his will. His own feelings and how he reacted to his current role as king. He was a tyrant and wanted others to have no say in things, much like the rest of the play. If even here he would've thought of his law and its affect he could've changed everything. Instead of being self centered and actually anticipating his subject's reaction none of the consequences of making this law would've happen.

The second place where something else could've happened was when Creon discovers that Antigone is the one who buried Polyneikes. "How could I get greater praise and glory than giving the brother I love a decent and honorable burial and these men would agree, if only their lips weren't locked in fear of you. But then, of course, tyrants have the power to do and say what they please "Page 123. Antigone's behavior allowed no other reaction from Creon because he was the king. Instead of being so boastful Antigone could've been slyer, denying the fact that she was the "traitor" as Creon had put it. She would not have gotten her glory but she would've gotten away with her life and have known she did what she did secretly. I think that had she acted this way Creon would've let her go free. But since she had boasted he had to defend his status because someone talking back to him in this way (a women no less) threatened him. "Aren't you ashamed to talk treason!" Page 123.

In the scene which Haimon is talking to Creon about Antigone, Creon and Haimon do not agree because Creon is not listening to his son and thinks that Haimon is being ridiculous. Instead of ignoring what Haimon was trying to say, Creon could've tried to

listen and take Haimon more seriously. "Then judge not by my age and on the wisdom of my words." (Page 128) or Haimon could've tried talking to his father more than once. If he did more than once his father could've listened but he gave up after one time. I thought that Creon wouldn't have changed his opinion because of his stubbornness. Listening to his son at this point would've stopped what was going to happen. (When he actually decided to it was too late.)

These alternatives would've changed the play for the better. They were the scenes where pride and will had blinded or affected the characters' decision. None of the alternatives I wrote happened because the play is still a tragedy, partly because that made it and interesting story and partly because the characters were too darn stubborn.
